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Executive Summary

The Ministry of Transportation and Transit (the Ministry) is in the early stages of planning for the creation of the Uptown Transit-Oriented Development (TOD) in Saanich, B.C.

As part of the planning process, the Ministry undertook early engagement with First Nations, stakeholders and the public in 2024 to seek input to inform the planning and design moving forward.

This engagement included:

- Meetings with First Nations
- Meetings with 20 stakeholder organizations
- Public engagement website with an online survey
- News release
- Post-card mail-out
- Social media posts
- · Pop-up event
- Open house

A total of 641 online surveys were completed. Key results include:

- 76% of respondents either strongly agreed or somewhat agreed with the values underpinning the Uptown TOD.
- The top three ranked types of housing respondents would be most interested in seeing at the Uptown TOD are apartments, stacked townhomes, and family friendly homes (3+ bedrooms).

- The top three ranked categories of services and amenities that respondents would like to see as part of the Uptown TOD are plazas and gathering spaces, health and wellness, and restaurants and cafes.
- The top three ranked active transportation facilities that respondents would most like to see included in the Uptown TOD are enhancement of connecting trails and facilities, water stations, and secure shortterm visitor bike and scooter parking.

The Province will utilize the feedback gathered to continue to work with First Nations and project partners, including BC Transit, Capital Regional District, and District of Saanich to inform project scope and design criteria.

The Province is committed to continued engagement and consultation with First Nations throughout the development process.

1. About Uptown TOD



Transit-Oriented Development (TOD) is an approach to land use planning that locates high-density, mixed- use development within walking distance from frequent transit services. It promotes the creation of complete, liveable, and sustainable communities by building more homes near transit and services.

When developed, the Uptown TOD will provide hundreds of new homes and a transit exchange with connections for active transportation—walking, cycling and rolling. In addition to the transit exchange, the plan proposes multiple buildings with hundreds of housing units, new public gathering spaces, retail and commercial space, and potential for amenities, such as childcare, community health facilities and educational services.

The new development proposes to integrate with and enhance the existing Lochside and Galloping Goose regional trails, becoming a key connection for active transportation and transit, with connections to downtown Victoria, the University of Victoria, the West Shore and the Saanich Peninsula.

The Uptown Transit Exchange will serve as a transfer point between the broader transit network and three planned RapidBus Lines.

These RapidBus Lines include:

- West Shore RapidBus Line (95 BLINK Langford/Downtown)
- McKenzie RapidBus Line (96 BLINK Uptown/UVIC)
- Peninsula RapidBus Line

The development of the future Uptown Transit Exchange will improve transit connections in the Uptown area and support further transit service investments within the Victoria Region, phased over time.

Key Objectives

- Create a mixed-use community with a focus on transit and mobility hub connections, housing and public spaces
- Provide a future-ready transit exchange
- Increase market rental and housing unit supply
- Incorporate community services such as offices, childcare, education, civic amenities, health clinics, retail and restaurant space

Key Features

- The rapid bus exchange will have capacity to meet BC Transit's expected long term (20+ year) service planning assumptions for local and regional bus service connections in the Uptown area of 95+ buses per hour at peak.
- The site will integrate with and enhance the existing regional trail network (Galloping Goose and Lochside trails), attracting active transportation users.
- The new development will have convenient proximity to the Trans-Canada Highway #1.









4. Please rank the types of housing you would be most interested in seeing at the **Uptown TOD.**²










7. If the active transportation facilities you noted above are included in the Uptown TOD, how likely do you think you will travel by more active modes of transportation?







3.2 Key Themes from Stakeholder Meetings

The following are key themes from the stakeholder meetings with 19 organizations:

Design, Uses and Amenities

- Interest in public washrooms being located within the development
- Strong interest in a coffee shop located within the new development
- Desire to see public spaces, including parks, within the new development
- Call for improvements to Regina Park as part of the project
- Request for a childcare centre as part of the development given significant demand in the surrounding area
- Questions and concerns regarding the number and height of buildings on the site
- · Requests for affordable housing or nonmarket housing within the development
- Interest in how much public parking would be provided

Active Transportation

- Requests for end of trip facilities such as bike lockers, E-bike or E-scooter charging, bike valet, and bike security
- Importance of maintaining connectivity and efficiency for Galloping Goose and Lochside Trail users through the future site
- Questions and concerns about trail closures of the Galloping Goose and Lochside Trails during construction

Accessibility

- Importance of including universal design professionals on the team to ensure the final design is accessible for everyone
- · Requests for trails that are designed for adaptable bikes (e.g., E-Trikes) along with the appropriate grade of trail (3% maximum)

Transit

- Concerns about the current transit system's lack of connectivity within the Greater Victoria region
- Interest in BC Transit's long-term plans for the Victoria Regional Transit system and how Uptown TOD would fit
- Support for ensuring that the Uptown TOD be future-proofed to ensure capacity for a potential light rail transit system
- Desire to see private bus companies have access to the new terminal for regional travel

About the Uptown TOD

The Uptown TOD will be located at a key junction for Greater Victoria.

December 2023—new provincial legislation was introduced, requiring some municipalities to designate Transit-Oriented Development Areas near transit hubs. This includes the area within a 400-metre radius of the Uptown Exchange.

April 2024—the Province announced the acquisition of two parcels of land to support a future TOD at Uptown with hundreds of new homes, community amenities and a transit exchange.

Planning for this development is in the early conceptual stages. We are working with partners, including BC Transit, the Capital Regional District, and the District of Saanich, to design the development.






Why are we developing the Uptown TOD?

The population in Greater Victoria is growing quickly. From 2016-2023, it increased by more than 50,000 people (more than 13%)*.

This development will help address the region's housing shortage and create an efficient, integrated and complete community where people can easily access the daily necessities of life and rely on public transit to connect them to their work and social lives.

When developed, the Uptown TOD will provide hundreds of new homes and a transit exchange with connections for active transportation—walking, cycling and rolling.

A transit exchange at Uptown will be a cornerstone in the Greater Victoria Transit network, with connections to major job centres in the region.






Uptown Transit Exchange

Uptown will serve as a key transit exchange and transfer point between the broader transit network and three planned RapidBus Lines.

These RapidBus Lines include:

- West Shore RapidBus Line (95 BLINK Langford/Downtown)
- McKenzie RapidBus Line (96 BLINK Uptown/UVIC)
- Peninsula RapidBus Line

The development of the future Uptown Transit Exchange will improve transit connections in the Uptown area and support further transit service investments within the Victoria Region, phased over time.



Phase 1 - Complete

The West Shore RapidBus Line (95 BLINK Langford/ Downtown) was officially launched in April 2023. Transit priority investments continue on Highway 1, Douglas Street, and the Island Highway to support additional travel time and service reliability improvements.

Phase 2 - Ongoing

Planning for the launch of the McKenzie RapidBus Line (96 BLINK Uptown/UVIC) is currently underway as part of the Tillicum-McKenzie Corridor Transit Plan.

Infrastructure investments continue to be planned for all three RapidBus alignments, including the West Shore, McKenzie, and Peninsula RapidBus Lines.



Regional Trestles Renewal, **Trails Widening and Lighting Project**

Through this project, the Capital Regional District (CRD) plans to widen and light sections of the Galloping Goose and Lochside regional trails with a 6.5m separated use pathway design and renew three trestles within the project area.





Trestle and trail upgrades will be made over time with consideration being given to other planned public works, such as MoTI's Uptown TOD, and with the busiest sections of trail being given priority.



A sustainable and resilient development

When designing the Uptown TOD, we will consider potential opportunities to enhance the natural environment on the site, such as:

- High quality building performance to reduce carbon emissions
- Passive shading design to minimize heat island effects
- Creation of onsite natural areas such as daylighting creeks to store rainwater and help reduce heat island effects


The team will continue to work with partners, including BC Transit, Capital Regional District, and District of Saanich to inform scope and design criteria.






