April 30, 2010

#### **General Comments:**

- 1. Wetlands play a vital role in ensuring water quality and quantity in British Columbia.
- 2. Conserving wetlands is fundamental to Integrated Watershed Management.
- 3. Wetland protection and restoration must be a priority for British Columbians and the BC government.
- 4. DUC advocates formal protection for wetlands in the provincial Water Act.
- 5. DUC advocates the development of a no-net loss/ net gain policy for wetlands in BC that is supported by an effective and enforceable mitigation/ compensation framework.
- 6. Mitigation/ compensation must put an emphasis on impact avoidance and minimization and not simply compensation.
- 7. DUC wants to continue working collaboratively with the province and other partners to develop strategies that protect water resources, wetlands and water related ecosystems in BC through the Wetlands Stewardship Partnership.
- 8. DUC advocates transparency in the WAM process and would like to maintain communication with the Ministry of Environment while legislation is developed in the coming months.

#### **Specific Comments**

#### **Goal 1: Protect Stream Health and Aquatic Environments**

- Wetland health is integral to stream and watershed health
- Protecting all wetland types (swamps, marsh, fen, bog) whether permanent/temporary provides an important source protection for water quality and quality.
- Language In the Act must recognize all wetlands classifications in BC. Definition of wetland must be expanded beyond swamp/ stream and account for all wetland classifications, including ephemeral wetlands.
- Allocation decisions should take place only after assurance is made that there is adequate water for species and ecosystems
- Riparian area protection is critical for water quality and supply
- Over and above wetland protection, restoration is important for water quality and quantity

#### **Goal 2: Improve Water Governance**

Regardless of the governance model chosen, DUC wants assurance that there will be rigorous standards that will apply provincially and that cumulative effects will be carefully monitored.

❖ DUC, through the Wetland Stewardship Partnership has relevant information and tools that can help build capacity at a local government level to improve governance. (Green Bylaws Toolkit, Wetland Ways)

#### Goal 3: Introduce more flexibility and efficiency in the water allocation system

- Wetlands play a critical role in ensuring water supply.
- DUC supports a science-based approach to water allocation in BC that ensures adequate flow for species and ecosystems before allocation decisions are made.
- DUC supports flexibility of allocation and the use of the precautionary principle, particularly because of uncertainty about climate change and how this will affect our water systems in the future.
- Wetland restoration in key areas supports water quality and quantity. Opportunities for wetlands restoration should be considered provincially, and particularly in areas where there are supply and quality issues.

#### Goal 4: Regulate groundwater extraction and use.

- Wetlands are critical for groundwater recharge
- DUC strongly supports legislation that regulates of groundwater in BC
- DUC supports science that increases knowledge of groundwater process, impacts and availability in BC.

### We want ecosystem protection for wetlands in the Water Act modernization

In the existing *Water Act*, there is no mention of wetlands — only swamps. All wetland classes need to be explicitly identified and protected in the new legislation. The provincial government has set four goals for the *Water Act* modernization:

- The Stream health and aquatic environments are protected
- > Improved water governance framework
- The An efficient and flexible allocation system
- The quality and use of ground water is protected

The only way to achieve all of these is through integrated watershed management. An integrated watershed management strategy puts wetland ecosystem protection at the forefront.

In Living Water Smart, the British Columbia government committed to:

- The Legislation recognizing water flow requirements for ecosystems and species
- > Wetland and waterway function will be protected and rehabilitated

Government should enable a no net loss wetland policy to follow through on its commitments. When it comes to wetland loss, avoiding and minimizing impacts should be highest priority and compensation only a last resort. If you are charged with taking care of our future water supply and make no mention of ecosystem protection, of which wetlands are an integral component, you won't succeed.
