Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the draft proposal for the Water Sustainability Act.

The draft proposal is a good start, but our water deserves the best possible protection. I urge you to include more protections, clarity and commitments to protect water for the future and for nature.

Binding standards need to be included in the WSA to protect water for fish, wildlife and stream health. Guidelines are not good enough. We need a scientific definition and commitment to ensuring the protection of water flows for fish and other environmental values.

Our water objectives must prioritize water for fish, wildlife and essential human uses. These objectives must apply to all industries, including forestry, oil and gas and other industries. We need an explicit statement that any private right to use water cannot harm the public's interest in water resources.

Watershed governance is increasingly important for water management in the 21st century. Please provide a clear mandate and resources for local watershed groups to engage in this important process.

Water Licenses need to be reviewed regularly - not every 30 years. We must have the flexibility to adapt to our changing climate.

We need appropriate fee schedules for groundwater and surface water that supports responsible water management.

Increased public participation in the granting of water licenses is critical to monitoring the impact on environmental flows. Please revise the process to enable increased public participation. The public deserves the right to review water licenses and monitor the impact on environmental flows.

The ownership of water must remain within the public realm, and be protected with regards to quality and it's availability to provide sustainable and healthy environments for all. Removing significant quantities of water from an ecosystem or watershed will have an impact that must be understood and seriously considered when any extraction is being sought. Without informed and legislated protocols, the resource most essential to our survival may be compromised or lost to short-sighted commercial gain. This concern arises as a result of the controversial management of our fisheries, our forests, natural gas resources and our inability to date to find common ground with First Nations regarding land use and conservation.

How we manage our water is a matter of the utmost importance because every living being depends on its availability. Water cannot be privately owned or transported from the living ecosystem it serves. The desire to establish private control of water as a commodity for short term profit will cause tremendous harm and it is for this reason that powerful protection be enacted by the province now.

The act created should have a strong non-political and public overseer of the act's implementation and application with regards to all licenses and to every use, including natural resource extraction.

There needs to be accommodation and respect for local perspectives regarding regional use of water resources as was agreed with other land use proposals such as gravel extraction or shell fish farming.

Meanwhile, Fisheries and Oceans Canada biologists and conservation staff are inspecting a 25-kilometre stretch from the point of the release into Apetowun Creek to the Athabasca River, a breeding area for Alberta's only strain of native rainbow trout

If British Columbians are to mitigate risk, fracking should be band. And before entertaining the Oil giants at the table, pay very close attention to the Trans-Pacific Partnership Free Trade Agreement, written primarily by Corporate America. If you think your good at writing in Gordon Cambellesque "weasel clauses" into the Water Sustainability Act, you better prepare yourself for issues similar to what Ecuador is facing by trying to chase down Chevron for a \$19 Billion bill, for polluting their environment - for more than 10 years. Chevron has taken up hiding under US Law ...kind of a home-free position, where they can thumb their nose at other Country's Laws.

We should consider the salmon as our canary in the coal mine. Low ground water levels in our area mean that some people are having to truck in water in the summer. Meanwhile, logging continues in the headwaters of our watershed and proposed development has been given the go ahead, without any attention paid to the flowdown effect on present users or the environment. As climate change continues unabated, the situation will only become worse. It is vital that careful consideration be given to new legislation to ensure sustainable management of water, a public resource, over the difficult years to come.

I would like to make a few suggestions regarding the B.C. government's proposed Water Sustainability Act (WSA).

The new act must ensure that water remains a public good. It must include strong legal protection of "environmental flows" to maintain healthy functioning rivers and water bodies.

Environmental flows and essential household needs should be defined as a "beneficial use" instead of the currently proposed narrow and private use oriented definition.

The WSA must ensure that water pricing for commercial use reflects the inherent value of freshwater. Water fees should be set high enough to fund comprehensive water management in the province. Companies such a Nestle should not be allowed to extract 265 million litres of Fraser Valley ground water for free. Oil and gas companies should not be allowed to pay a mere \$2.20 to extract the equivalent of 132 truckloads of fresh water for fracking.

The WSA must provide for meaningful public participation in decisions regarding water governance.

The WSA needs to include a public trust doctrine to ensure that any private rights granted under water licences are subject to be managed in the interests of present and future generations.

The WSA must ensure that no industry is exempt from the Water Sustainability Act. This applies in particular to the oil and gas, and timber industries. The WSA must apply to both existing water licences as well as to new licences.

Fresh water is a precious, finite resource. In the face of climate change and population growth, we must ensure that B.C.'s use of fresh water is sustainable. The new Water Sustainability Act must ensure that sustainable management of this public resource trumps private water rights.
