





MINERAL TENURE ACT AND MINES ACT

Mineral Tenure Act:

Authorizes the registration of mineral and placer claims

Mines Act:

Addresses the health, safety, and environmental risks

BC Mineral Tenure System Stages and Authorizations



FREE MINER CERTIFICATE

- Registration required
- Age and residency requirements
- Individual and corporate application fees



CLAIMS

- "Staked" on Mineral Titles Online (MTO)
- Exclusive 'right' to explore and develop a mineral resource
- Enables initial exploration activities to use, entry, and occupancy



LEASES

- Increases production limits
- · Interest in the land
- Longer term (up to 30 years)
- Consultation requirements

Permitting for Advanced Exploration and Development

- Mechanized exploration and mining development require a permit under the Mines Act (based on definition of a "mine")
- BC consults with First Nations during permitting

Commitment to "modernize the Mineral Tenure Act (MTA) in consultation and cooperation with First Nations and First Nations organizations"






Consultation & Cooperation
